High demand for teachers

The demand for teaching staff is always high. This is to ensure the teacher to student ratio is maintained in schools. Supply teachers are always required to fill in for teaching staff that are on training courses.

In addition to this, in Wales there's a high demand for education through the medium of Welsh. Welsh speaking teachers are needed in Welsh schools as well as in English speaking schools to teach as a second language.



You can further your career

Teaching offers great progression opportunities and job security. A career in teaching comes with earning a competitive salary with a generous pension. There are many steps in the teaching career ladder including becoming the head of department, head of year and other senior positions within the school or college.

Here are examples of teaching roles:

Teacher / Supply Teacher

A teacher or a supply teacher is responsible for educating pupils from all ages, such as early years, primary, secondary or adults. A primary school teacher is required to teach multiple subjects, whereas a secondary school teacher will usually specialise in one subject. Responsibilities include planning lessons, marking work and giving feedback, monitoring students' progression, creating lesson resources, going to staff meetings and parents' evenings, and identifying underachieving students and providing extra support if required.

Teaching Assistant / Learning Support Assistant

Teaching Assistants and Learning Support Assistants work with teachers and provide support to the learning of pupils of all abilities in primary, secondary and special schools. The role requires good communication skills, patience and sensitivity, the ability to deal with challenging behaviour and to be caring and helpful. Helping with learning activities such as reading and writing, creating displays of pupils' work, getting things ready for lessons, recording progression of pupils and supervising pupils at break time or on school trips are other aspects of the role.

Lecturer

Lecturers teach students in further or higher education in Colleges and Universities in a subject they specialise in. The role requires to plan and deliver



lectures, host seminars and tutorials, assessing and marking assignments, and conducting research. Lecturers might have to take part in team meetings to discuss course issues, as well as having contact with organisations such as examining boards.
